Twenty Fifth Sunday in Ordinary Time.

There is no such question as to who is "the greatest in the service of God". We are all infinitely loveable in the sight of God.

Competition starts very young in life – we have here a story about jealousies among the first disciples of Jesus. He has just spoken about his death and now they are arguing who is the best of the group. But he does not get involved in their argument instead he calls a child – the child was a nobody in those days and greets that child with love. He does not ask us here to become like little children but to welcome them just as they are. He is somehow highlighting something very important – welcome and hospitality. A welcome for everyone in the love of God and in the church. This was his lesson to their jealousies. Our care for all whom we meet. Our care should also extend not just to each other as individuals but to all of creation.

We are here to care for and not subdue creation. This requires a change of mindset.

Climate change affects us all; but it affects the poorest and weakest of us most of all. Children, suffering poverty and hunger, families made homeless, farmland made barren or flooded. We have a duty to act to protect these most vulnerable of our brothers and sisters.

Take time each day to give thanks for the earth, for the food we eat and the air we breathe. Give thanks for the beauty of creation – the things that nurture not our bodies but our souls. The quiet places we escape to when the busy ness of life is too much, the beauty of nature which can brighten our dark days. The more we remember to be grateful for the earth the more we will remember our duty to care for it. Jesus reminded His disciples that they must be humble servants – in our care for creation we are the humble servants of future generations.

This week – start making some small changes: refuse plastic in a store; turn off lights you do not need; it won't change the world immediately but if we all get into this mindset, things can change.

Why care – because the heart of God goes out to the cry of the earth and the cry of the poor.
